Richmond City Health District CHWs Respond to COVID-19

COVID-19 has added to the work of CHWs with the Richmond City Health District (RCHD). RCHD CHWs are now front-and-center in the city's efforts to provide testing in Richmond's three public housing communities. For Patrice Shelton, Certified CHW (Senior), part of her work has been battling sources of misinformation about COVID-19 that some public housing residents have received. The trust that Ms. Shelton and her CHW colleagues have established in the

community has helped residents navigate through challenges they face in finding accurate information and sources for their health and social needs as the virus has disrupted service schedules. With the RCHD providing CHWs with the necessary personal protective equipment (PPE), the CHWs have continued making home visits. In addition to addressing the day-to-day needs of their clients, the CHWs are reinforcing COVID-19 precautions while encouraging and supporting testing. WVTF, Richmond's public radio station, has a short audio clip on the testing efforts in the housing communities that you can listen to here.

Virginia CHW Workforce Development Council Launches Website

During April, the Development Council launched its second communication vehicle (the first was the Development Council Newsletter distributed in early April) by publishing its website at www.chwva.org. The site will have information about the Council's work, the growth of Virginia's CHW Workforce, and more.

The website will archive Council meeting agendas, materials, and meeting minutes in addition to information on the Council's three Committees. Monthly newsletters will be archived on the site. The site has a form for requesting a speaker for groups interested in knowing more about the CHW Workforce in Virginia or the work of the Council. A CHW Education and Library page lists education and CHW research articles. We encourage your feedback regarding the site.

Development Council Approves Core Competency Curriculum Review Process for CHW Certification

During its April 22 meeting, the Virginia CHW Workforce Development Council approved the Committee on Curriculum, Training, and Certification's requirements for curricula leading to certification as a Community Health Worker in Virginia. The Council also approved having the Virginia Certification Board receive, review and approve curriculum submissions based on the Committee's seven core competency elements.

Core competency education and training must meet a required minimum of 60 hours. The table below shows the core competency domain areas and the minimum hours necessary for each domain area. Education can be delivered online or via the classroom. A supervised practicum of 120 hours is required and 2,000 hours of experience over three years. How Roanoke, Virginia, Is Addressing Income Disparities And Their **Impact On Health Outcomes**

In an article in Health Affairs blog, Bob Cowell examined the link between poverty and health outcomes and Roanoke's effort to implement the Pathways HUB partnership. "A collection of community partners led by the United Way of Roanoke Valley launched the Pathways HUB partnership to improve coordination of care. This collaborative places community health workers with those seeking care at a myriad of locations across the greater region, helping them identify and overcome barriers and establish progress on pathways to better health. Pathways may include "prescriptions" for healthy foods, exercise, or techniques to manage diabetes. Since its inception in 2017, data showed that more than 244 community members have participated with 347 pathways defined, resulting in a 67 percent decrease in avoidable emergency department visits and a 73 percent decrease in subsequent avoidable inpatient admissions, plus an 87 percent decrease in length-of-stay days."

Rollins School of Public Health at Emory University Offers virtual Lifestyle Coach Training

This training is open to individuals who are affiliated with organizations that have pending recognition or intend to apply for CDC recognition. Both lay and professionally trained individuals are welcomed to become Lifestyle Coaches. Visit CDC's website to view the curriculum and learn more about CDC recognition.

Completing the four weeks of guided coursework and attending the four live virtual sessions is required for successful completion of the training and receipt of a Certificate of Completion. Cost of the program is \$649. Find more information on the course here.

For every \$1 spent, the Return-on-Investment was \$1.81

Community Health Worker Return on Investment Study Final Report (May 31, 2017)

A Nevada Study seeks answers to four questions; (1) Do CHW services reduce overall medical costs for super-utilizer clients with three or more ER visits in six months? (2) Do CHW services reduce the number of acute admits, acute readmits, Emergency Room visits, and urgent care visits? (3) Do CHW services increase primary care provider visits? (4) What is the impact of CHW services on prescription costs?
